Women in STEM Conference 2023 - We're Back!

Redding AAUW branch has been hosting conferences since 1995 when we collaborated with SCOE and Shasta College to create the first Math and Science conference for junior high girls in Redding. This association continued through 2014 when size and logistics required a move to another location until 2023. We are delighted to be back at Shasta College.

The 2023 Women in STEM Conference was a great success:

- •60 schools registered from across the north state representing Siskiyou, Shasta, Tehama, Trinity, Glenn, Butte and Lassen counties.
- •212 girls and 32 adults (teachers and parents) attended the conference where
- •35 professional STEM women presented 25 STEM career pathways.
- •12 Interactive Stations provided explorations in STEM subjects during morning registration and lunch.
 It was a very busy and engaging day!

More than a dozen famous women in STEM as well as local notable women in STEM were featured throughout the event this year so that our girls may appreciate the great contribution women have made in these career fields.

A host of generous volunteers were busy across the Shasta College campus to bring this unique event to our North State girls. Thank you to everyone who helped make this event a success. I want to give a special shout-out to Joann Roskoski, Sharon Clairemont, Penny Harris, Maureen Chenoweth, Anne Prielipp, Gail Paulsen, Pris Brutlag, Alison Krupit, Mari and the many committee members who worked so diligently to bring the event to fruition. 
Shasta County Grand Jury, and quickly became known to her peers as one that they could count on to write and proof many of their findings.

LGBTQIA+ PRIDE MONTH:

From the Library of Congress:

"Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) Pride Month is currently celebrated each year in the month of June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan. The Stonewall Uprising was a tipping point for the Gay Liberation Movement in the United States. In the United States the last Sunday in June was initially celebrated as 'Gay Pride Day,' but the actual day was flexible. The purpose of the commemorative month is to recognize the impact that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals have had on history locally, nationally, and internationally."

LGBTQIA+ is one of the current descriptions used to describe the population of lesbian, gay, bisexual, pansexual, transgender, non-binary, intersex, queer, questioning and asexual individuals in our community. It is more accurate than most of the language that is used to label this group.

In July 2021, for the first time ever, the Census Bureau initiated a series of nationwide surveys that included questions about sexual orientation and gender identity. One of the primary missions of the Census Bureau is to develop a factual demographic, social, and economic understanding of the United States:

California has the largest lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender population—2.7 million—in the nation.

California's share of adults who identify as LGBT (9.1%) is considerably higher than the share in the rest of the nation (7.9%).

According to this data, about half (49%) of LGBT adults in California describe themselves as bisexual, similar to the rest of the US. Slightly over one third (36%) describe themselves as gay or lesbian, and 15% as transgender.

The data indicates that there are 543,000 same-sex married couple households, 469,000 same-sex unmarried partner households, and 191,000 children living with same sex parents.
