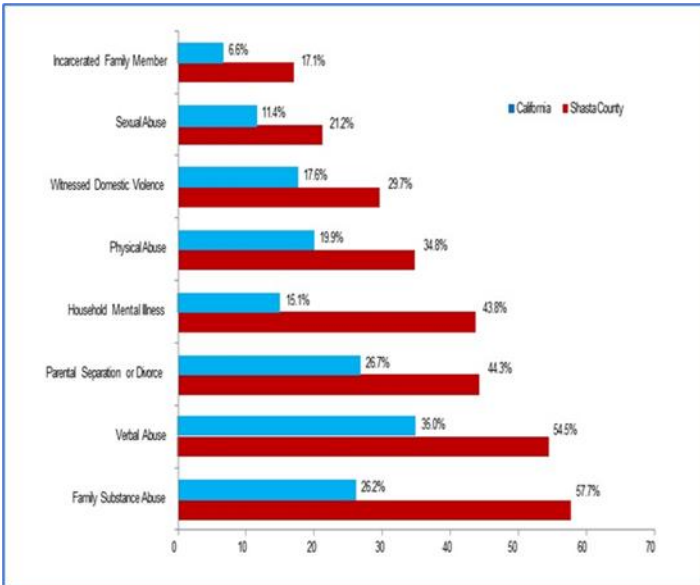

ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EXPERIENCES

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) have been identified as a major public health issue in our community and we are struggling to deal with it. I participated in a discussion of the Community Health Assessment during March and almost every issue in their plan can be traced back to “ACEs.”

So, what are the adverse childhood experiences that we call ACEs? This is a study that was completed by Kaiser Permanente in the late 1900s and early 2000s and continues today. The ACEs include physical and emotional neglect; physical, emotional and sexual abuse; and the household problems of intimate partner violence, incarceration, substance use, mental health disorder and divorce. Shasta County has a very high rate of ACEs, about double the average in the state of CA as seen in this graph:



We have all heard the comments and statistics about our high child maltreatment rates, about our substance use statistics, about our domestic violence rates, about our generally poor health in this county. All those are reflected in our ACEs statistics here.

The issue is how to address ACEs and how to prevent intergenerational transmission of ACEs which we know is possible. ACEs are what happens to us; they do not need to define what happens to us next. The effects of ACEs can be addressed by the community, by each of us.

It is important to recognize the role that ACEs play in chronic health conditions, so it is not surprising that these 10 issues are directly connected to the poor health in our community. Research shows

that the population with 4 or more ACEs has a lifespan 10 years shorter than the average life span. Shasta County has one of the poorest health ratings in CA, as outlined in the [2022 California County Health Ranking](#), and that affects us all.

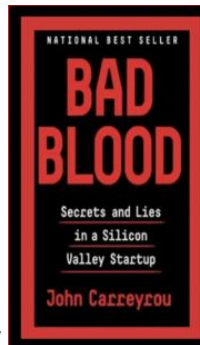
