What: A fabulous art show, silent auction, and wine tasting.


Where: At the North Valley Art League's Carter House Gallery in Caldwell Park, Redding.

In her position as Executive Director of the Youth Violence Prevention Council, Susan is focused on helping kids who have made bad choices to redirect their lives. At our next AAUW meeting she will explain the Youth Peer Court, in which kids who are in trouble have their offenses judged by their peers and pay back the community

through appropriate service. The program gives them an intimate look at the legal system. One of Susan's surprising comments was that a lot of future lawyers get their first taste of law in Youth Peer Court!

PUBLIC POLICY-DIVERSITY, EQUITY and INCLUSION AAUW CALIFORNIA Expands Education Goal and Establishes New Project

A Pause to Reflect in the Midst of **National Hispanic Heritage Month** (September 15th - October 15th).

Latina Equal Pay Day is October 5th and the day to remember that Latina women are paid on average 54 cents for every dollar paid to non-hispanic white men.

The good news is when women organize progress is made.

Recently about 50 immigrant Hispanic women in New York City organized the first US women-led workers' hub through which they have created **Liberty Cleaners**, an educational-advocacy group where they learn about their rights for fair wages and safe working conditions as well as green cleaning procedures.

Closer to us, the mostly Latina immigrant garment workers in LA County experience "wage theft" and deplorable working conditions. Sixty per cent of all US fashion garment workers are in the LA area. Recently they organized and formed **Remake**, a women's rights group for ethical fashion and were able to get SB 62, The Garment Workers Protection Act, passed and signed into law by Gov. Newsom.

But what about our nation's **Dreamers and DACA**? The Dreamers are undocumented immigrants brought to the USA as young children who live here without legal status. In 2012 President Obama signed an executive order called the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program or DACA which is a two year renewable work permit with access to student loans and other programs. It is a temporary program which has been on a legal roller coaster for years and last month was declared illegal again. A case to determine its legality is expected to go to the US Supreme Court. Experts say a bill passed by congress is the legal way to give the Dreamers a pathway to citizenship. Roberto G. Gonzales, Harvard Professor of Education has written **Lives in Limbo: Undocumented and Coming of Age in America** in which he profiles young adults and the positive effects of DACA not only in the lives of the DACA youth, but in their families and their communities.

What can we do? Perhaps read Professor Gonzales' book, look into Remake's clothing industry vision or what the NYC Liberty Cleaners are up to, and support local Hispanic businesses. La Cabana anyone?

Movies Spark Animated Conversations

The Redding Branch Movie Group has met for about 20 years. A group of 20 to 30 members and their spouses watch two or three movies per month and meet at a restaurant in the evening to discuss the movies. Two members coordinate Movie Group while different volunteers give a brief presentation and then the whole group discusses the movie.

Recent movies have included: Oppenheimer, Barbie, Asteroid City, Call Me Kate, Don't Look Up, She Said, The Whale, Women Talking (nicely presented by two husbands). We've also discussed documentaries like The Dust Bowl, The Great Hack, and Crip Camp.



The reason this has been a closed group is that it's so popular that members rarely quit once they've joined. Plus, most restaurant meeting rooms have a cap on the number of people allowed at one time.



October Book Group, Tuesday, October 17th, 2:00 pm Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an *average* woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel—prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind.



But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show *Supper at Six*. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.

Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, *Lessons in Chemistry* is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.

Travel interest group's first meeting will be on Wednesday, October 25th at Karline's restaurant. Our first presenters will be Daryl and Penny Harris sharing their 3-week adventure trip to Peru. The first week of their trip featured hiking on the Inca Trail to Machu Pichu, considered to be one of the 10 best hikes in the world. Other hikes on that list included the John Muir Trail, Napali Coast Kalalau Trail, and Mount Everest Base Camp. About 1.5 million people visit Machu Pichu yearly, but of those, only about 25,000 people hike the trail. The second and third weeks focused on lodging in an eco-lodge along the Amazon River and Lake Titicaca.
