PROGRAM: SHASTA LAND TRUST PROJECTS



I'm sure you would all agree that we are very fortunate to live in the Redding area where we are surrounded by the natural beauty of our land and waterways. On Thursday, February 15th, the Shasta Land Trust will present photos and information about the properties it has conserved to guarantee the beauty of the North State is preserved for future generations. In 2023 more acres were conserved than ever before. Lake Britton, Fall River Lake, falls and creeks along the Pit River, Fall River, and Hat Creek regions, two ranches, and a rice farm were added to the Shasta Land Trust, a total of over 22,000 acres.



Attention AAUW members! It's that time of year when we are again taking applications for scholar-ships. #### Women's Issues Interest group



The group met in January to discuss gender bias. According to the AAUW National website, "Despite decades of investment in Women's leadership programs, progress in advancing women has stalled. AAUW is committed to closing the gender leadership gap once and for all." Women seeking leadership roles lag behind largely due to old stereotypes of "masculine traits," lack of flexibility in scheduling for women seeking a work/life balance, lack of networking opportunities and outright bias and discrimination.

As a group we discussed the need for gender inclusive programs beginning at the earliest opportunity and increased emphasis on programs and policies promoting women in leadership roles. We also discussed the current bias against women in leadership roles in Shasta County Government and the need to be supportive of our local women leaders.



South India, also know as the Peninsular India, occupies 19% of India's area and 20% of India's population. It is bound by the Bay of Bengal in the east, the Arabia Sea in the west and the Indian Ocean in the south. The region has a tropical climate and depends on monsoons for rainfall, but it also has a dry inland climate. The endangered Bengal tiger and the Indian elephant are found on the peninsula.
