



First, Public Policy:

Most likely you have voted by the time you read this. Thank you.

There may still be time however, to check with the eligible voters in your family and among your friends. Have they voted? Ask them to consider our member-approved priorities when voting. In brief our member approved priorities that guide our work are: 1. Economic Security for All Women, 2. Equal Access to Quality Public Education for All Students, 3. Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society and 4. Increased Representation of Women in Leadership Roles.

This month we will each be able to suggest changes or additions to these policies as AAUW CA will be sending a Public Policy Priority survey to your email soon.

Secondly, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion or DEI:

Now is a good time to take a look at AAUW's national website to see our "Latina Initiative." You can find it under "Research and Data" on the home page.

Some current stats from AAUW's research:

Thirty million Latinas are currently working in the US giving our economy vital support but many see little return for their work.

In 2019, all Latinos contributed 2.6 trillion to our economy yet Latinas continue to earn 55 cents for every dollar earned by white, non-Hispanic men.


AAUW stands ready to serve as a resource to address the challenges facing Latinas. You can see AAUW's policy recommendations based on this research and also meet AAUW grant awardees of Hispanic origin at the end of the research, "Latina Initiative."

Lastly, in case you missed this news, the Nobel Peace Prize was recently awarded to Nihon Hidankyo, a grassroots movement established in 1956 by Japanese atomic bomb survivors to warn all countries of the danger of nuclear weapons and urge that they not be used.

Let's continue to learn from each other.


Drama Divas Wednesday November 6, 1-4 p.m. Hostess: Tammy Douse

Learn how Mineral grew from a small store in the 1800s into a full-fledged resort with cabins, motels, gift shop, restaurant, golf course, swimming pool, and ski run. Discover its earliest inhabitants, the Yahi Indians, and the first emigrant settlers as well as some of the colorful characters who later called Mineral their home.

Jo Ann Perkins grew up in Mineral where her parents owned and operated the Mineral Lodge for sixty years. She shares her memories in this delightful book.
