## A Message from the President



We've been so busy it's easy to get wrapped up in branch activities and forget the bigger picture of belonging to a national organization. Our Inter-Branch Council meeting March 1 was a good reminder that we and other nearby branches have projects, goals and ideals in common, and our very successful Women in STEM Conference on March 29 found many of us working together to excite, inspire and guide girls about their futures. Our local projects support national goals of equity, education and advocacy for women and girls.

AAUW National helps us remember we are part of a large and influential organization supported by intelligent, goal-driven women across the country.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find an article by Suzannah Gerlach, our branch Vice President for AAUW Funds, in which she explains how the funds we raise support AAUW programs on a national level. Please support raising money for National's Greatest Needs Fund by contributing when you renew your AAUW membership in the coming months and by supporting our upcoming Garden Tour.

The national office informed us in March that our national dues will increase modestly this year and next. As of this month, the national portion of our dues will increase \$2 annually to \$74. In April 2026, they will increase to \$76. Our national directors want us to know that while costs for member support have increased annually, member dues have not kept pace. Membership dues support public policy and advocacy programs defending higher education and rights for college women, provide member training programs, and support member-led activities such as Lobby Corps and the "2-minute Activist" effort. We need to support the organization responsible for our existence.

### Coming up

Our April branch meeting program will feature our community's Building Bridges effort. Kaylie Brisbon, CEO of United Way of Northern California, and new member of our Branch, will share with us the latest updates of this project. Like AAUW, United Way advocates for equity and inclusion for all and is endeavoring in a special project to unite parts of our community to "create a culture of respect, belonging and civility." ## AAUW Redding Branch, Inc. AAUW Funds Named Gift Honoree, 2025

### Judy Bush

Judy Bush has been an active member of AAUW for 13 years, filling many roles with a smile and enthusiasm. She currently chairs the Travel Group, promoting travel in the U.S. especially to National Parks, participating in-depth learning programs, and she encourages members to share their travel experiences. Judy is Volunteer Coordinator for the Garden Tour, and was Head Hostess for 11 years for the Home Tour, as well as having on the Home Tour the Geodesic Dome home she and her husband built. Judy is a faithful volunteer supporter of the Women in STEM Conference and has served on conference registration, a challenging position. She has also been a member of the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee and Education Committee. In the 2023-2024 program year, she chaired the Ad Hoc Fundraising Committee tasked with coming up with a fundraising plan that incorporated goals for each area, to make sure the events were scheduled without conflicts, and try to make fundraising less burdensome for the membership. She did an outstanding job tracking all of the ideas and making sure that all members of the committee were able to provide input. Judy is a strong supportive member of the Social Committee, was a co-chair; now she finds the best wines to serve at dinner meetings, and you can always find her helping clean up afterwards. She promotes membership in AAUW and generously supports Branch activities and events. Judy works to support educational activities in the arts, science and openness to cultural differences.



Judy's community leadership activities include being Co-President of Shasta Community Concert Association for five years and serving on the board for 10 years. She helped create a system to provide morning concerts for local school students to attend performances at Cascade Theatre at no charge. Judy became a docent for Camden House in Whiskeytown National Park, playing the role of Mrs. Camden. She did extensive historical research, traveling to Chico and Weaverville to find details, in order to provide the most accurate representation to visitors. Judy transcribed documents; letters and recipes, creating the Camden Recipe booklet that includes the recipe for Mrs. Camden's wedding cake. Judy and her husband were strong supporters of fundraising for Shasta Land Trust by coordinating the silent auction at the annual fundraising event. For over 12 years she helped host a couple of Wildways events each year, providing scrumptious meals for guests and promoting the Land Trust.

Judy attended Chapman College and ended up marrying her brother's friend, Dave Bush. They raised two children, and Judy ran a small preschool in her home when they were young. When they moved to Redding they built their own Geodesic Dome home, and Judy could be found on the very steep roof with her trusty hammer in hand. After finishing building the house, she received her Teaching Certificate and taught elementary school for over 25 years. Judy volunteered to help run the Gateway School District Christmas shop where children would come to buy gifts for their parents. Each summer, before her four grandchildren became college students, she hosted a week long summer camp where the grands learned to build, cook, sew and create.

Personally, Judy works tirelessly on each project she is involved in, using grace and intelligence. She is strongly family oriented, empathetic, has courage, generosity, openness and is a good and dear friend. The community is a better place because she is involved.

## Greatest Needs Fund

### What is it? Why does our branch contribute to it?

As an AAUW member, you believe in advocacy for women and girls. You believe in pay equity, in education, in economic security, and in fairness.

Most of the funds we raise as a branch go to our local Scholarship Program that supports women graduating from Shasta College who wish to complete four-year degrees or obtain professional certificates, or for local middle school girls to attend the Tech Trek summer camps at UC Davis.

But, we are more than a local organization. We are part of a large National Organization of 170,000 members that seeks to improve the lives of all women and girls in the U.S. by addressing, at the national level, issues like pay equity, educational opportunity, and women's health. However, the dues we pay to AAUW National do not support the full cost of activities at the national level because only 5% of its net assets are unrestricted.

The Greatest Needs Fund was established to allow AAUW to respond rapidly, in its communication and advocacy, to critical issues affecting women as they emerge - like a new threat to Title IX. Growing Greatest Needs support ensures effective operations, execution of mission-critical work and the long-term sustainability of AAUW.

#### **The Greatest Needs Fund Supports:**

- Groundbreaking research and effective advocacy work to pass fair-pay laws and other key equity legislation
- Updates to and dissemination of AAUW's widely-cited signature research reports and advocacy for AAUW values (the research and policy budgets are supported almost entirely by the Greatest Needs Funds)
- Staff time and other direct expenses for the Salary Negotiation, Financial Literacy, and Leadership Programs and the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL),
- Activities to keep AAUW at the forefront of a National dialogue about Womens' Equity, by growing its media exposure and maintaining a prominent seat at the table.

Each AAUW Branch donates to the Greatest Needs Fund (GNF) to support these activities. The Garden Tour on May 10 is our big fundraiser for the year. The proceeds raised from the event will benefit both local scholarships and the GNF.

And, because our brand contributes to the Greatest Needs Fund, we have the ability to have a Named Gift Honoree. Every year the AAUW California Fund Committee honors AAUW California members who have done outstanding work in supporting the programs and goals of the AAUW Fund and/or AAUW California. 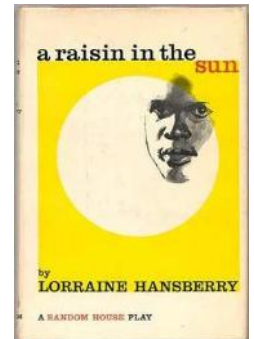

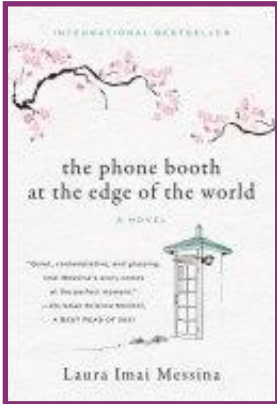

### The Phone Booth at the Edge of the World

By Laura Imai Messina



Laura Imai Messina's international bestselling novel is a story about grief, mourning, and the joy of survival, inspired by a real phone booth in Japan with its disconnected "wind" phone, a place of pilgrimage and solace since the 2011 tsunami.

When Yui loses both her mother and her daughter in the tsunami, she begins to mark the passage of time from that date onward: Everything is relative to March 11, 2011, the day the tsunami tore Japan apart and when grief took hold of her life. Yui struggles to continue on, alone with her pain.

Then one day she hears about a man who has an old disused telephone booth in his garden. There, those who have lost loved ones find the strength to speak to them and begin to come to terms with their grief. As news of the phone booth spreads, people travel to it from miles around.

Soon Yui makes her own pilgrimage to the phone booth. But once there she cannot bring herself to speak into the receiver. Instead she finds Takeshi, a bereaved husband whose own daughter has stopped talking in the wake of her mother's death.
