

May Branch Meeting Thursday, May 15, 2025 Community Room, Redding Library at 5:30 pm Jennifer Middleton, Kid's Turn




Half of marriages in the United States end in divorce leaving children fearful, sad, depressed, guilty, and insecure. Kid's Turn is a psychoeducational program to help kids understand and express the traumatic

emotions they feel about parental separation. The program provides weekly workshops for both parents and their children to learn how to manage the changes in their families with the goal of promoting communication between parents and children and making kids feel less alone.

Jennifer Middleton is the Executive Director of Kid's Turn Shasta Cascade with a long history of working with children. She has a master's degree in psychology and Marriage and Family Therapy from the University of San Francisco and has served as the director of Northern California Center for Family Awareness since 1996. AAUW California offers this statement concerning a proposed increase in state dues: "A notice was sent to all members that the AAUW California Board of Directors has placed a dues increase on the ballot this month. Despite cutting costs, we find ourselves limited in how much more we can offer branches and members in terms of support and resources. We discussed this at length and reviewed the value that we feel the state organization brings to you. We hope you will agree it is worth an extra 83 cents a month and vote yes!"

Having observed members of the CA Public Policy team, Amy Hom and Missy Maceyko, at work I can vouch for their expertise and dedication to making sure AAUW policy priorities are presented to state legislators. California AAUW has dynamic directors. So, make your voice heard when accepting, rejecting, or selecting ballot initiatives and candidates. Most of the funds we raise as a branch go to our local Scholarship Program that supports women graduating from Shasta College who wish to complete four-year degrees or obtain professional certificates, or for local middle school girls to attend the Tech Trek summer camps at UC Davis.

But, we are more than a local organization. We are part of a large National Organization of 170,000 members that seeks to improve the lives of all women and girls in the U.S. by addressing, at the national level, issues like pay equity, educational opportunity, and women's health. However, the dues we pay to AAUW National do not support the full cost of activities at the national level because only 5% of its net assets are unrestricted.

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STEM Conference

March 29, 2025, Shasta High School

240 participants from 9 counties and over 50 schools attended this year's conference.

Forty-two women shared their careers with presentations and hands-on activities in 23 breakout sessions. Normally the conference is held at a college, but due to construction we held it this year at the original Shasta College dedicated by President Truman 75 years ago. When the College moved out to its present location in the 1960s, Shasta High took over the campus.

The day opened with breakfast in the cafeteria followed by investigating 10 Interactive Stations in the Gym. In addition, posters all over campus and banners in the gym encouraged the girls to learn about Famous Women in STEM. Emcee Jeanne Crawford directed an opening of the conference which included Key Note Speaker Ellen Hedfield and encouraged the middle school girls to expect the unexpected! Then off to the breakout sessions!

Lunchtime in the cafeteria also included time for more investigating of the Interactive Stations and finding more famous women in STEM in the gym. Closing ceremony brought opportunities for many of the girls to take home gifts baskets from all of the branch's interest groups.

AAUW 2025 Redding Community Woman of Achievement Crystal Spencer



Crystal Spencer is this year's Community Woman of Achievement. As the Executive Director of Faithworks, Crystal oversees the daunting challenge of housing homeless families. The nonprofit Faithworks, a collaboration of local churches, offers guidance and case management to help families transition from homelessness to permanent housing. Faithworks also offers the following:
Permanent housing at St Francis Court - residents continue to receive services to keep them moving forward.

- •Transitional housing for veterans on Lake Blvd.
- •Outreach services to unhoused individuals clients are guided in their search for housing.

Crystal has overseen the growth of Faithworks to increase their budget, get numerous grants, start outreach services and build a well-trained, cohesive staff. This is critical work in our community where the need for family housing is much greater than what Faithworks can meet with their units.

An Alaskan Native, Crystal was once an unhoused single mother battling addiction. She graduated from Faithworks, received an AAUW scholarship in 2014 and went on to get her Master's Degree in Management and Leadership. Hired as the Executive Director of Faithworks in 2019, Crystal brings compassion, vision, wisdom and faith to her work. Crystal is a joyful, thoughtful person who has a deep faith which she relies on to carry her through the difficult job she has. A homeowner and happily married mother of boys, Crystal overcame her own struggle with poverty, addiction and homelessness to compassionately work with unhoused families in need. We are honored to have her in Shasta County and proud to present her as AAUW Redding Community Woman of Achievement.

Redding on the Map at Lobby Days

Your Lobby Days Team was initially disappointed to be on the road at 5:30 a.m. April 8, with only one scheduled meeting: Assemblymember Zbur who represents District 51. So, our fearless leader, President Sharon Clairemont, led Maureen Chenoweth and me to our Assmblymember Hadwick's office, and one of her staffers welcomed us right in. We spent 20 minutes sharing with Joseph Encinas AAUW-CA's positions on our three priority bills. We asked that Rep. Hadwick support **SB 771** which would hold social media-tech companies responsible for their AI when it intensifies hate messages that can lead to illegal actions. We also urged her support of **SB 418** which protects equal access to health care for all Californians regardless of gender. Lastly, we asked for a "no" vote on **AB 579** which could be used to keep a child in an abusive home. This bill targets marginalized trans youth.

Why is AAUW standing up for the Transgender Community? AAUW-CA Public Policy co-chair Missy Maceyko states, "When AAUW says that we support ALL girls and women, that means we always support transgender girls and women, and that we offer them extra support right now, at a time when their need is greatest." You can read Missy's full explanation in the March Public Policy Newsletter. Just go to AAUW-CA website and click "Public Policy" at the top of the homepage. Open "Newsletters." Choose March and scroll to page 4. I think it's worth a look.

Just a note: Heather Hadwick drives through Redding most Thursdays according to her staffer. Perhaps a collaborative forum with Ms. Hadwick, local Republican Women, Shasta College Ag instructors, HS FFA leaders. North State Agriculture is a strong focus of Assemblymember Hadwick.

Why not join our Lobby Days team next spring? It's exciting to meet other branch members and our state AAUW leaders in person and to feel the possibilities as you rub shoulders with other lobbyists and those who make the laws.

AAUW-CA Voting Now Happening

Be sure to send in your vote regarding: 1. an annual state dues increase from \$20 to \$30; 2. board members (perhaps vote to continue Amy Hom and Missy Maceyko for two more years as Public Policy Chairs); and 3. the updates to our Public Policy Priorities.

DEI—May 5th is National Day of Awareness for Missing Murdered Indigenous Women & People

Nationally, Native Women go missing and are often found murdered at 10 times the rate of all other American women. This can be due to law enforcement jurisdiction issues between tribal, county, state and national authorities as well as bias and generational trauma which can lead to mental illness and substance abuse. Generational trauma is often the result of the abuse of native children in state and religious boarding schools.

April Carmelo, local Native American educator, reports that currently there are 15 Shasta County missing indigenous women. You can join April and others to **march for awareness of the MMIW May 10th at 10 a.m**. as part of the City of Shasta Lake's Boomtown Festival Parade. If participating, please wear red. **Unable to join the march?** Consider watching these documentaries: **"Sugarcane"** academy award nominated film on Hulu and **"Missing from the Fire Trail Road"** also available on Hulu.

We will be reading 12 Angry Men by Reginald Rose, a courtroom drama that centers on a jury deliberating the fate of a 16-year-old boy accused of murdering his father. As the jurors discuss the evidence, tensions rise and personal biases come to light, particularly from one juror who believes in the boy's innocence. The play explores themes of justice, prejudice and moral responsibility, ultimately highlighting how reason and compassion can prevail over personal biases.



We will begin our 25th season this coming fall. For one annual fee of \$11 (which covers postage and to receive the first batch of plays), you will have the opportunity to read eight or nine different plays next year. This is a small group setting, where we have 10 copies of the play and each take turns reading parts. Lively discussion follows. All AAUW members are welcome to join us.
